AB 1705 clarifies the vague or confusing aspects of AB 705. The goals and standards of proof are the same. The important loopholes are closed. Allowances for below transfer level work are made clear: Non-US high school graduates, certain certificate programs, noncredit ESL, students with disabilities, adult education, dual enrollment, CTE, and where there is evidence of benefit to students.

**Discussion Points:** 

- BTL ENGL courses can be carefully revisited by the faculty to determine whether an ENGL or MATH course is needed for the student to be likely to be successful.
- The current placement process is based on student reporting of high school grades.
- Credit support courses need to be revisited since they pose unanticipated challenges with student motivation • and accountability.
- The English department is no longer offering BTL courses. When considering to remove BTL English courses, the faculty, in collaboration with English department, may consider other options to ensure likelihood of student success. The options may include credit support courses, noncredit courses, and mirrored courses.
- Admission and Records: Josie C shared that noncredit course grades are not included in the official transcript. The noncredit/community education has a record of student attendance. The satisfactory progress (SP) as a grading option helps track the student attendance in the noncredit course.

- Counselling. Lainey C mentioned that noncredit hours impact the student course load.

pathway are not aligned with industry needs. After meeting with our articulation officer, an academic counselor familiar with this pathway, and colleagues from Cal Poly, it was determined that there is a need for **two different degrees** –

- one designed for those wishing to earn an **A.S.** and move directly into the workforce while still meeting transfer requirements for most CSUs (the degree in this proposal "Agriculture"), and
- one designed for those seeking transfer and to meet the more specific selection criteria of Cal Poly SLO.

There is a forthcoming proposal for a new degree ("**Agricultural Science**") to accommodate transfer-seeking students who wish to apply to Cal Poly, with changes in required courses.

This degree will change its **name** to clarify its broad scope of purpose and will maintain the original course requirements, which are most appropriate for employment and valuable for transfer into other CSU agriculture programs. The catalog description has been updated to reflect this purpose. An additional change within this proposal is to add new AHC agriculture courses to the list of approved electives from which a student may select their 9 elective units. The added courses are recently approved additions to the course catalog. ADD: AG 157, AG 162, AG 163, AG 164, AG 165, AG 315, and VT 102.

- PD 700. The course was renamed as PDNC 7100.

## **AHC Graduation Requirements**

### Competency in Reading, in written expression, and in mathematics has been demonstrated.

Students will demonstrate competence in reading by completing the general education requirements (below). Students will demonstrate competence in written expression by completing English 100 (grade C or higher) or English 101 (grade C or higher).

**NOTE:** Students who plan to transfer to a four-year institution should demonstrate competence in written expression by completing English 101 rather than English 100.

Students will demonstrate competence in mathematics by meeting any one of the following standards:

- A. Pass one of the following courses with a grade C or better:
  - any 100 level math course of at least 3 units
  - Math 309, Math 321, or Math 331, (Note: these courses will no longer be offered after summer 2022).

- B. Successful completion of Algebra 2 or higher at an accredited collegiate institution.
- C. A score of 3 or higher on AP Statistics or any of the AP Calculus exams.

## **Multicultural-Gender Studies**

A MINIMUM OF THREE UNITS IN MULTICULTURAL/GENDER STUDIES have been completed. (Not required for Associate in Art for Transfer (AA-T) or Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T) programs).

The purpose of the Multicultural/Gender Studies graduation requirement is to promote our students' awareness about, their understanding and appreciation of, and their respect for underrepresented groups and ethnic minorities. Courses that are designated as fulfilling this requirement are designed to help students link their personal experiences and their education to broader cultural perspectives, to expand their awareness of their own cultural heritage, and to encourage in them the skills of cultural competence which can foster the meaningful communication and connection needed in global heterogeneous societies.

Health and Wellness. The purpose of the Health and Wellness graduation requirement is to promote awareness and understanding of the significance/importance of the lifelong process of actively increasing the quality of one's decision making such that it leads towards a more positive, comprehensive state of well-being, beyond a state of merely being free from illness, injury, and/or disease. (Not required for Associate in Art for Transfer (AA-T) or Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T) Degrees.)

- Area 1 Physical Activity (Performance-based course)
- Area 2 Health Education or First Aid Safety (Lecture-based course)

## DOUBLE-COUNTING POLICY

Students are permitted to use up to six (6) units to satisfy both GE and major requirements thus receiving subject credit in the major and having to select 18 or 15 units of general education from the five GE categories.

## **CATALOG RIGHTS**

Graduation requirements for an associate degree or vocational certificates are determined according to the catalog in effect at the time of initial enrollment. To maintain catalog rights, a student must be in continuous enrollment during each successive academic year. For purposes of catalog rights, the academic year begins each summer and ends the subsequent spring session. To maintain continuous enrollment, a student must attend at least one credit class in an academic year.

Students must apply for graduation within three (3) years from the date all requirements are satisfied. It is important to note that:

- 1. Students who maintain continuous enrollment at Allan Hancock College, or students who are continuing at another accredited institution within the United States are eligible to graduate from Hancock under the catalog in effect at the time they first enrolled at Hancock .
- 2. Students who stop attending Hancock for a year or longer are eligible to graduate from Hancock under the catalog in effect the semester the student re-enters Hancock again. One year is defined as one academic year. The student must maintain continuous enrollment thereafter.
- 3. If a student attends another college after they have not attended Hancock for a year or longer, and does not reenroll at Hancock, they are eligible to graduate from Hancock under the catalog in effect the semester they petition to graduate. One year is defined as one academic year.

Exceptions to the above policy may be made by the director, Admissions and Records, for medical reasons or for military service.
