STUDY SKILLS WORKSHOP

The Counseling department has developed this workshop to help students develop/improve their study skills. The workshop will also provide an activity that focuses on self-awareness and how it may relate to study styles/habits. By attending this workshop, students will learn strategies to perform better and be successful in and out of the classroom.

GRADES MATTER WORKSHOP

The Counseling department has developed this workshop to help students understand his/her academic and/or progress standing. Students will learn strategies to get back on track and regain good standing with the college. The workshop will also cover the consequences of being on probation such as unit limitation, financial aid eligibility, and priority registration. Students who receive a probation email notification are strongly encouraged to attend the workshop.

TIME MANAGEMENT WORKSHOP

The Counseling department has developed this workshop to help students enrich their time management skills. The workshop will provide students with tools and guidance and learn how to use their time more effectively. In addition, this workshop will cover common obstacles to effective time management that will help students assess their won time and priorities.

FINANCIAL AID

<u>SOME THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW</u>

- Do not assume you don't qualify for financial aid. In fact, one out of two applicants receives financial assistance.
- Applying for financial aid is free! Simply complete the form online at www.fafsa.gov
- For maximum financial award, apply by March 2 of every year. You can still apply after that date and anytime throughout the year.
- Types of Financial Aid:

Grants: funds for college, based on financial need, that do not require repayment.

Loans: money borrowed at a low interest rate that requires repayment after leaving college or falling below half-time enrollment.

Scholarships: funds for college that do not require repayment.

California College Promise Grant (formerly known as BOG Fee Waiver): waives your enrollment fees at a California community college.

Once you've qualified for the California College Promise Grant, you must maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher <u>and</u> complete more than 50 percent of you coursework in order to avoid losing it.

PUENTE ELIGIBILITY:

- Eligible for English 101 with 112
- Plan to transfer to a university
- Make a one-year commitment to all Puente Project components
- Minimum 2.0 GPA

STUDENTS OF THIS PROGRAM:

- Take English course with a curricular focus on Latino literature and experience.
- Take personal development courses that focus on student success and career exploration.

- Are matched with a professional from the community, who will share their knowledge and experience. This will provide mentorship opportunities.
- Experience cultural activities, assist the community, and develop leadership skills.
- Meet frequently with the Puente counselor to develop and monitor a student education plan and for personal/career counseling.

CAN BENEFITS

As a CAN-TRIO Scholar, you will receive individualized assistance through an intense monitoring system. You will be supported in reaching your educational and career goals, and in identifying a successful path towards graduation and/or transfer.

CAN STATS

- 94% of CAN-TRIO Scholars are in good academic standing.
- **92%** of CAN Scholars persist from one year to
- **49%** of CAN Scholars receive an Associate's degree/certificate AND transfer WITHIN four
- 71% of CAN Scholars receive an Associate's degree or certificate WITHIN four years. (compared to 36% among all AHC students and 32% at peer institutions – 2016-2017 data)
